Dear Friends

This has been a mixed year, in which some parts of the gardens progressed and other areas retreated. New bulbs were planted along the beech hedge and elsewhere, and the group cleared and is remodelling a bed just outside the garden entrance to Mycenae House. However, a falling tree crushed many of the larger plants we had previously planted in the Glade, and the remainder were overrun by brambles before the fallen tree was cleared away. You can read more of our successes and setbacks elsewhere in this newsletter.

A particular focus this year has been on trying to improve and facilitate communication with and between the members of the group. The hope is that, with easier communication, members will be more involved and will find it simpler and more congenial to join in the efforts to preserve and enhance the gardens. As a first step, we have set up a Facebook group (currently open only to members, although that may change). This has so far attracted little interest, perhaps because it has not been sufficiently advertised, but perhaps because Facebook's star is falling. We have more recently set up a Twitter feed. Details of both are to be found at the foot of this page. Please join or follow one or the other. They will allow members to contribute their thoughts and ideas for development of the gardens. They will allow us to advertise work that needs doing, not just as in the organised 'planting days', but also minor tasks that can be undertaken by any member with 20 minutes to spare. And we hope that the photos and other contributions from each of us will enable all to appreciate and enjoy these gardens.

Coincidentally, we have been coping with the bureaucratic whirlwind raised by the General Data Protection Regulation. All existing members will be asked in due course to give new and explicit consent to our holding their names and email addresses. We fear that this will be one of many such requests that you will receive, but we have to do it. Please forgive the intrusion, but do not overlook the message: if you do not explicitly consent we shall have to take your name and details off the membership list.

Autumn planting day

The autumn planting day saw a small but dedicated group of members and supporters plant several hundred bulbs and

carry out other works of routine maintenance. Here, two volunteers show how to weave the beech hedge. (There is an explanation of this technique in the Facebook files).

The borough's Parks and Open Spaces strategy is: "To work in partnership with the local community to provide and sustain ... safe, attractive, diverse and flexible parks", specifically by working with local Friends groups. The groups provide ideas and management tailored to the needs of the particular park and its users. This only works if users get involved.



The shrub beds

The children of the Greenwich Steiner School have been repairing and replacing the ropes and stakes around the shrub beds. These are still being cut with depressing frequency. The culprits are unknown.

The children have also been tending to the shrubs more generally – see the picture right.

While the children were tending the shrubs in these beds, other shrubs were suffering from erosion. In December the GSS teachers pointed out that three shrubs in particular had been suffering from heavy footfall (out of school hours), and suggested that they be roped off. That work, and the loosening of the soil around the shrubs, is imminent at the time this newsletter goes to printing. The slopes further down the hill still suffer. Remedies suggested by the committee were rejected by the council on technical grounds, although the

council has agreed to shore up the exposed roots of a vulnerable holly.



Elsewhere ...



A joint effort by teams from Mycenae House, the Council and the Friends cleared this overgrown bed and replanted it, first with a tree provided by friends of the late Janet Gillespie, and then (by the time you read this) with other shrubs and bulbs,

chosen to provide some colour throughout most of the year.

The experimental turf planted in November 2016 had a promising start, but has not had a good winter. We are no longer so hopeful that it may provide an answer to the erosion or to returfing parts of the bare ground. We would welcome any further suggestions for dealing with the problem.
